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Celebrating 10 years of the Furniture Help Scheme

CDFHS, County Durham Furniture Help Scheme, recently celebrated 10 years in their premises on Chilton Industrial Estate. The scheme was set up

in order to help individuals and families on low incomes to purchase affordable furniture, household items and electrical goods; in fact everything that can turn an empty house into a home, and at

a very reasonable cost.

The story of how CDFHS came about is a remarkable one. Back in 1970, Chris Palmer, the founder member of the scheme, was working at Torrington Engineering in Darlington when he collapsed. He woke up in Darlington Memorial Hospital and was told he wouldn't work again because of the after effects of a serious head and spine injury sustained whilst he was in the Royal Navy.

Out of work, Chris thought, 'what do I do now?' Fate played a part when he met a friend who said he had a lot of good furniture which was going to be thrown away. He thought this was a waste, so he transported the furniture to his garden shed and placed a note in his local newspaper.

He later landed 3 garages in Newton Aycliffe which were going to be demolished by the council, moved the furniture in and started trading. Things picked up, and with 6 volunteers helping out, it was

time for bigger premises, so Chris contacted Sedgefield District Council who offered him a small unit on Chilton Industrial Estate. Things progressed even more rapidly, with Chris acquiring additional units. Initially the workers were just volunteers and people on placements, many of whom had not worked previously, but after training some have found employment and others have starting their own business. CDFHS now have 50 workers, some volunteers, some on placement and others on grants from various statutory and voluntary organisations. Chris said, "Every week we continue to help families

and single people set up home, either for the first time or to restart a home after some problem, as well as helping families to add that little extra to improve their home without getting into debt. "The demand for our services continues to rise with the number of clients coming to our showrooms to select goods now over 3,000 per month". If you have any unwanted furniture, ornaments, pots & pans, pictures, gas or electrical appliances, (working or not) including, washing machines, vacuum cleaners, tumble driers, computers, curtains, bedding, clothes, shoes, paint or wallpaper, which are too good to throw away, call

Local artist Norman Cornish dies

Local artist Norman Cornish, the last of the Pitman Painters, passed away on Friday 1st August, aged 94. Norman spent 33 years working underground and spent his life painting images of the North-East pit communities. He was the last surviving artist of the Pitman's Academy at The Spennymoor Settlement, which was set up in 1930 to give mining families access to the arts. Mr Cornish was one of its most famous students. Bob McManners from Bishop Auckland, who worked with Gillian Wales to write a biography of the artist entitled 'The Quintessential Cornish', said, "He saw himself as an artist who happened to be a miner but he hated the title of Pitman Painters. "He worked in the Dean and Chapter Colliery at Ferryhill

for many years until 1966 when he decided to pursue a full-time art career. "He was a wonderful draughtsman who could pick up people's attitudes and characteristics in a few strokes. "I think he is one of the greatest artists which Britain produced in the late 20th century and some of his bigger works can sell for up to £30,000." Ms Wales, added, "The im-

portant thing about his work is that there's an honesty to it. It expresses the reality of the miners' lives. Malcolm Marsden, secretary of the Spennymoor settlement, said, "He drew people round him in pubs playing dominoes and darts and in the street and people could recognise themselves in his paintings. "He was a great character and he will be greatly missed."

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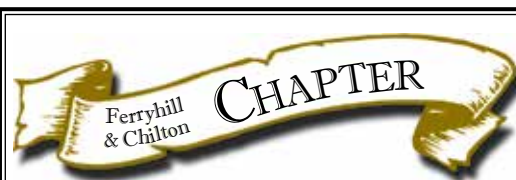

The awards, which are now in their 25th year and are managed by Durham County Council on behalf of the County Durham Environment Partnership, celebrate environmental projects and community activities that improve and enhance the local area.

The categories open for nominations this year are:

- Built environment
- Climate change
- Community partner-

- ship
 - Craftsmanship
 - Greener business
 - Natural environment
 - Places and spaces (new category)
 - Schools and colleges
 - Volunteer group of the year
 - Volunteer of the year - under 18
 - Volunteer of the year - over 18
 - Waste management
- Judges can also upgrade awards to 'outstanding' if they feel that an entry has exceeded the category criteria.

Terry Collins, chairman of the County Durham Environmental Partnership, said: "The Environment Awards are a unique opportunity to showcase the fantastic environmental work that takes place in

County Durham.

"We want to make sure that in this special year - the 25th anniversary of the awards - that people have as much opportunity as possible to nominate environmental projects or individuals for an accolade."

Entries in all categories are welcomed but organisers are especially keen to receive applications for the climate change, craftsmanship and young volunteers sections.

Shortlisting and judging will take place over the summer before the winners are announced at a ceremony in Durham in November.

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Have your say on Children's Centres

Parents, carers and people providing childcare services for the under-fives are being asked to help shape a new approach to early years support designed to improve the lives of some of the county's most vulnerable youngsters.

Proposals for the future of Children's Centres in County Durham are now out for public comment and would see the emphasis shift from specialist buildings to community venues. Last month Durham County Council's Cabinet agreed a 12 week consultation on the recommendations which are designed to ensure under-fives, particularly in the more deprived areas of the county, are ready for school life. A paper outlined how despite some successes the current reliance on Children's Centres had failed to deliver the improvements hoped for.

As a result and following a review of Children's Centres, it is proposed that taking the services to the communities, focusing on places families already go such as community centres, schools and libraries, will be of greater help. Some of the proposed community venues for service delivery include Chilton Community College, Fer-

ryhill Clinic, Henderson Community House, One Point Hub and The LADDER Centre, although these venues will need to be risk assessed and meet the needs of families.

The Council's Children's Centres are currently arranged in five localities to ensure that all areas of the county have a proportion of Children's Centres consistent with their levels of deprivation. No change is proposed to these arrangements.

Within the 5 localities, Children's Centres are grouped into 16 'clusters', with each of the 16 clusters having a "Main" Children's Centre.

It is proposed to retain one Children's Centre building in each cluster, (with the exception of the Coundon cluster) thereby reducing the number of centres from 43 to 15.

The proposals would see the council retain these 15 specialist fixed venue Children's Centres, with the remaining 28 centres either transferring to schools and nurseries or being used for alternative purposes.

Within the 'Ferryhill Cluster', Dean Bank Children's Centre has been identified as the Centre which will be retained, meaning services at Chilton

Children's Centre and Fishburn Children's Centre will be transferred to an alternative provider.

The proposal states, "The aim of our proposals is to ensure that there are improved outcomes for children in early years.

"We believe by moving away from fixed provision in Children's Centre buildings and by holding activities in communities, services should be more accessible and closer to users.

"We will still be providing a wide range of services for children and families and we will continue to promote these services. Activities will not stop, rather they will be delivered out of the remaining Children's Centre building and also through community buildings, e.g. schools, community centres, libraries, leisure centres etc.

"Our intention is to use more venues to deliver services from, not less." Under the new proposals, Durham County Council expect to save around £1 million.

The consultation runs from 31st July until 23rd October 2014.

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New uniform requirements

From September 2014 students attending Ferryhill Business and Enterprise College have new uniform requirements.

All pupils are expected to wear: plain black trousers, plain black dress shoes, with a plain white collared shirt and the new black school blazer and school

tie.

No tight fitting or fashion trousers, or short or fashion skirts, are acceptable. Also, there are to be no fashion shoes or boots, no make up, jewellery (except a wrist watch), no earrings or ear studs, and extreme hair styles or hair colours are not permitted.

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Single contact number for neighbourhood wardens

A countywide contact number will make it easier for people to report a range of neighbourhood issues, including littering, dog fouling and anti-social behaviour.

Durham County Council introduced a single telephone number for its neighbourhood warden service across the whole county on Friday 1st August.

The number - 03000 261 000 - is already used by the majority of residents who wish to report problems such as littering, flytipping, dog fouling, stray dogs and anti-social behaviour.

However, residents in East Durham and Durham City have been used to calling a different number - 03000 261 018 - to request help

from the neighbourhood wardens.

This number will be gradually phased out so that just one number is used regardless of where people live.

Between 1st August and 31st October, people ringing 03000 261 018 will hear a recorded message advising them that the number has changed to 03000 261 000 and that their call is being automatically diverted.

During the following three months, until 31st January 2015, anyone ringing 03000 261 018 will hear a recorded message advising them of the change of number and asking them to re-dial.

Cllr Brian Stephens, Cabinet member for neighbourhoods and local part-

nerships, said, "A single telephone number for the whole of the county will make it easier for residents to get in touch and report environmental crimes and anti-social behaviour."

"Residents can be reassured that only the telephone number is changing - the service will continue to operate in exactly the same way as it does now."

The neighbourhood warden service is provided seven days a week. Further information is available at www.durham.gov.uk/neighbourhoodwardens.

Incidents that require urgent warden assistance should be reported to the police on 101 or by calling 999 if the situation is an emergency.

Have your say on wheelchair services

Registered wheelchair users across County Durham and Darlington are being asked to share their experiences of using the NHS wheelchair service as part of a review aimed at improving the service.

Local Clinical Commissioning Groups (CCGs), the organisations responsible for planning and purchasing the majority of health care services on behalf of their local populations, have launched the review to gather feedback that can be used to develop the

service for patients.

Sarah Burns, on behalf of the CCGs in County Durham and Darlington said, "Our main focus is maintaining patients' independence for as long as possible and this service plays a key role in not only doing that, but avoiding unnecessary admissions to hospital or residential care."

"Through this review, we aim to improve and develop the service into a fully integrated service for our patients that reflects advancing technologies

and is sustainable in light of growing demand."

Mainsforth Cricket Club

With no play possible for either of the club's two senior sides on Saturday (due to the weather), this week we focus our attention on the club's 4 junior sides, for whom the season is drawing to a close. The youngest of the junior teams is the under 11 age group, with this being the second season the club have fielded a side in the league at this level. The team have had a good season with improvement in both results and the number of players involved. They finished just above mid table, winning 5 of their 9 league games. The players involved are from as young as 7 years old, and the format of the Sunday morning twenty over matches ensures that all players are equally involved. The under 13 side started the season a little low on numbers but this improved as the season progressed.

With skipper Zak Strange being well supported by vice captain Brad Bihari, the team have recorded 7 league wins in 11 matches, with one game outstanding, this being almost twice the success rate of 2013. The under 15s are currently in 4th position (out of 11), with one game still to play. Two of the players from this team, Ryan Dawson and Aidan Cummings, have performed very well in the club's senior 2nd XI all season, and have also had some 1st XI games. Whilst the work that the club coaches have carried out has benefited all sides, the work put in over a number of years has really shown dividends this year in the all round performance of the under 18 side. This has been undoubtedly the strongest squad for a number of years. Mainsforth finished the season in 4th position with 6

wins from 9 league fixtures. The top 4 teams were only separated by 2 points at the end of the season with them all having 6 league victories. All members of this side are regularly involved in the club's two senior XI's. In summary, the juniors have represented the club very well in 2014, and although winning is only one of a number of objectives for the coaches, across all 4 junior teams the 2014 win percentage is currently 58%, compared to 39% in 2013. Full details of the club's indoor winter activities will be published in The Chapter towards the end of the year, when the club will be looking for more new players and to build on the progress made this year. League cricket returns to Mainsforth this Saturday (9th) when the 1st XI are at home to Esh Winning.

Ferryhill Celtic played Chilton WMC in the Dougie Wyn Memorial trophy final recently. It turned out to be a match packed with quality, and the Celtic were quick to get into the strike playing wonderful passing football from back to front. After only 10 minutes the Celtic could have been 1 up when the talented Kurt Seymour cut in from the edge of the box and skipped past the last defender, only for his shot to find the Chilton keeper. Next up it was Jay White who fired just wide of the Chilton post, but after 30 minutes the Celtic converted all their possession into a goal when the

Celtic centre forward Jonny Agar was brought down in the box, for a penalty and it was Agar who picked himself up and slotted the ball past the keeper. The goal seemed to spark Chilton into life and having a good spell of possession just before the break forced the Celtic goal keeper Kris Carr into a tremendous double save, but the half ended the Celtic 1-0 to the good. The second half started with Chilton picking up where they left off pushing for an equaliser, having 3 or 4 shots from distance and also looking a big threat from set pieces, but it was a mistake at the back that gave Chilton

their deserved equaliser. Chilton now had momentum playing some great football, but the game looked like it was heading for extra time when, with only minutes left, the Chilton centre forward was fouled in the box and the ref had no hesitation in pointing to the spot. Chilton made no mistake firing past the Celtic keeper to win the game for Chilton. M-o-m and player of the tournament, Liam Pearson.
