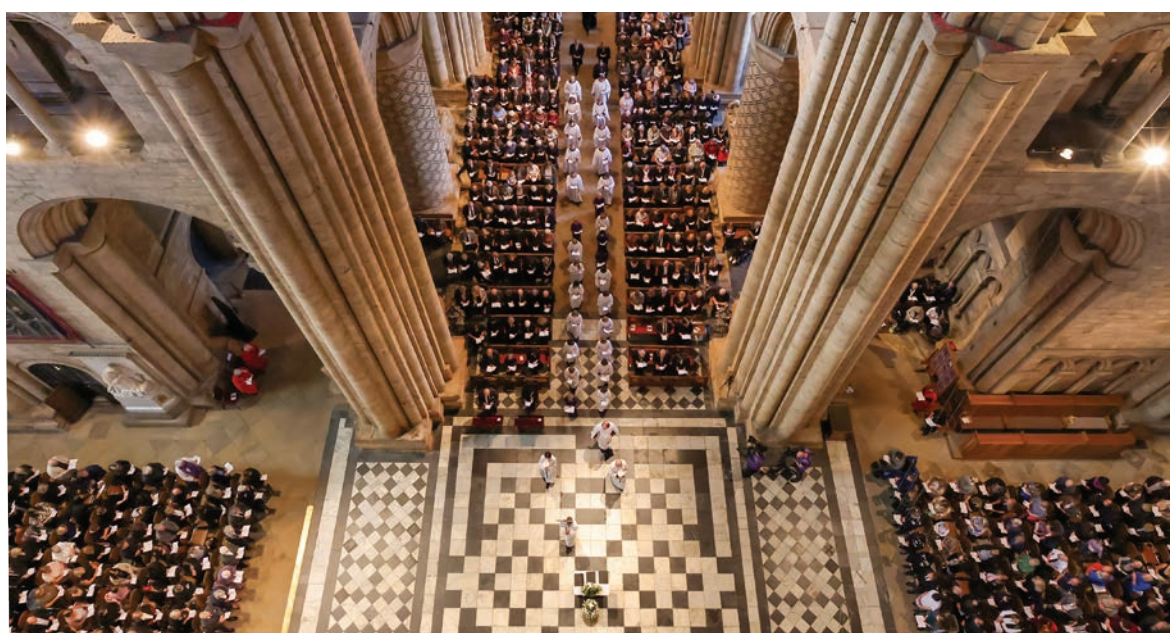
AWARD SHOW HELD AT AUCKLAND CASTLE

QUEEN'S SERVICE OF REFLECTION

A SERVICE of Reflection to give thanks for, and mark the passing of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II was held on, Saturday 17 September, at 3pm in Durham Cathedral.

The service to reflect on the life and passing of the late Queen saw the cathedral filled with

almost 1,000 people, with a further 350 watching live online.

A key moment in the service was when three children carried the Books of Condolence to the Cathedral's High Altar.

The books, were received by the Acting Dean, the Reverend

Canon Michael Hampel.

Members from the local community were invited to take part in the service by giving readings.

Sue Snowdon, His Majesty's Lord Lieutenant, and Professor Karen O'Brien, Vice-Chancellor of Durham University, gave readings from the

Bible.

Actor Charlie Hardwick read *Floral Tribute*, the official poem to mark Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II's death by Poet Laureate Simon Armitage.

Allen's leadership as the Durham Police and Crime Commissioner.

The scheme has grown exponentially.

Commissioner Joy Allen said, "I am so proud of how much the scheme has progressed. It has gone from strength to strength in recent years and this is a fitting accolade for the monumental achievements it has made. I hope that the Community Peer Mentors will continue to provide wrap around support for so many members of our community in the future."

Community Peer Mentors work to provide a voice for the unheard by empowering change and reducing the vulnerability of victims, survivors, perpetrators, prison leavers and someone who is simply neglected by society.

The Community Peer Mentors have supported nearly 3000 people across Darlington and County Durham since 2016, with the amazing volunteers providing over 184,000 days of support and helped towards an 81% reduction in contact with services, including reduced offending and hospital admissions. This has included an assisted reintegration back into society, by returning to employment and education. For many people in crisis, this has been a lifeline and without this support they would have taken their own lives.

Community Peer Mentors manager, Jim Cunningham said, "The fact is sadly clients will always be there to receive help from us but it takes volunteers who give up their time and their space to take others for-

ward and give them the options of how they can change their lives. We are delighted to receive this award and for all of the volunteers to be recognised for their tireless work for many across our community. It is such an amazing honour, one that I never imagined we would receive when embarking on this journey."

The Queens Award for Voluntary Service is the highest award that can be given to volunteer groups across the UK. It is an extremely prestigious award in line with that of an MBE. The award was created in 2002 for the Queens Jubilee and every year since, the fantastic work of voluntary organisations has been highlighted with this notable achievement. To be considered, the charity needs to show that they have made a big difference to their local community, be ran by volunteers, and demonstrate the highest levels of care in everything they do.

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COUNTY CALL FOR INCREASED GOVERNMENT FUNDING

DURHAM COUNTY Council, which is predicting a £15m overspend on its budget this year, has called on the government to "increase local government funding next year in recognition of the unprecedented and unavoidable pressures we are facing."

The call came from Cllr Richard Bell, Deputy Leader and Cabinet member for finance at the latest Cabinet meeting, which was due to take place last week but was postponed until this week due to the death of Her Majesty the Queen.

Citing the impact of rising inflation, increases in energy and fuel costs as well as budget pressures over the last two years as a result of the coronavirus pandemic, Cllr Bell said: "We face significant challenges in our budget because of rising inflation."

"We are not expecting to receive any additional

financial support from government this financial year which means we will need to rely upon our reserves to finance any overspend in the year."

In opposition, Cllr Carl Marshall, Leader County Durham Labour, said: "What I say to Cllr Bell is, 'welcome to our world.'"

"The Coalition refused to back Labour calls for increased government funding, maintaining the UC uplift and to freeze Council Tax."

BISHOP HERITAGE FESTIVAL CONTINUES

BISHOP AUCKLAND Heritage Festival, which opened this month, is offering the public the opportunity to learn more about the history of Bishop Auckland this autumn.

Its programme of events will see free exhibitions, fairs and talks take place.

The festival has been funded by Historic England and organised in partnership with Durham County Council, County Durham Forum for History and Heritage, and Bishop Auckland Heritage Action Zone.

Dr Anne Allen, HAZ project manager, said: "We have a wide variety of fascinating events taking place as part of the Heritage Festival with many of them free to attend.

"Please take the time to look at the different events organised and come along if you can."

From now until Sunday 20 November, the free exhibition *Picture This: Then and Now* will be held at Bishop Auckland Town Hall.

Running from 10am to 4pm, Monday to Saturday, it will reflect on the five years of the HAZ project to curate local heritage and restore the conservation area.

A visual story, it will be told through architecture, art and artefacts from the Bishop Big Dig.

On Saturday 24 September, a history fair organised by County Durham Forum for History and Heritage will be held from 11am to 3pm at the Town Hall. Visitors will have the opportunity to meet local history societies with music, re-enactment groups, guided walks, talks and bus tours.

At 7.30pm on Monday 26 September, Bishop

Auckland Civic Society will hold a talk with guest speaker Dr Andrew Breeze from the University of Navarra, in Spain. It will centre on a Viking battle which took place at Bishop Auckland in the year 844 AD.

On Saturday 1 October, a day focusing on the sporting heritage of Bishop Auckland will be held at King James Academy in the town involving Durham Amateur Football Trust from 10am to 3pm.

Jules Brown, from Historic England, said: "The festival is a fantastic opportunity for people to come along and find out more about the history of Bishop Auckland and what this means for us today."

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CHESTER STREET AND SOUTHGATE STREET, BISHOP AUCKLAND (TEMPORARY ROAD CLOSURE) ORDER 2022

The Council on 21/9/22 made the above Order under the Road Traffic Regulation Act, 1984 as amended, Section 14 (1) to prohibit all vehicular traffic from proceeding on 240 metres of Chester Street between its junctions with South Church Road and Newgate Street, and also a 33 metre length of Southgate Street between its junctions with Peel Street and Church Street, Bishop Auckland to enable carriageway resurfacing works to be undertaken. An alternative route will be available to vehicular traffic from the a) Eastern side of the closure from South Church Road westerly via Railway Street to Newgate Street b) Western side the closure from Newgate Street via Peel Street to South Church Road. The maximum duration of the Order is 18 months. The proposed works are to commence on 25/9/22 from 7pm to 6am nightly and are anticipated to be completed in 4 nights. On occasions, alternative dates for closure may be necessary and these will be signed accordingly.

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SCHOOL APPLICATIONS OPEN FOR 23/24



The deadline for secondary school applications is 31 October and for primary and junior, is January 2023.

PARENTS WHOSE children are due to start primary or secondary school next year can now begin applying for a place.

Durham County Council is accepting applications for the 2023/24 school year from this week.

If a child was born between 1 September 2018 and 31 August 2019, their parents need to complete an application form stating which primary school they would like them to attend.

Families will still need to apply even if they have an older child attending the same school.

They must also complete an application form

for older children wishing to attend a junior school from September 2023.

The deadline for applications for primary and junior schools is midnight on Sunday, 15 January 2023.

If a child was born between 1 September 2011 and 31 August 2012, their parents need to complete an application form stating which secondary school they would like them to attend.

The deadline for secondary school applications is midnight on Monday, 31 October.

Graeme Plews, education provision lead officer, said: "We strongly encourage parents to

apply in good time, and online if possible.

This will reduce the number of late applications and help parents get their preferred school."

Applications can be made online at durham.gov.uk/school-admissions or they can also be made by post.

If posting, the forms should be sent back using signed for or special delivery services.

Application forms can also be requested by phoning 03000 265896 or by writing to the School Places and Admissions Team at Green Lane, Spennymoor, County Durham DL16 6JQ.

BISHOP AUCKLAND FC climbed to the summit of Northern League Division One in midweek with a come-from-behind draw at Heritage Park against Northallerton.

On Saturday 17th, the Two Blues recorded a narrow 1-0 win over visitors, Newcastle Benfield.

The decisive moment came in the opening minute when a cross ball was blocked in the area by a trailing arm and Craig Gott stepped up to score the game's only goal.

Then in midweek, Northallerton journeyed to Heritage Park and took the lead, somewhat against the run of play, in the 12th minute when Joe Spalding fired home from the edge of the box

after a good move by the visitors.

However, another Craig Gott penalty, on the stroke of half time after Wayne Whitfield was upended, drew the hosts level.
