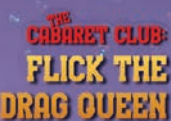
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CAKE AND PASTA CLASSES ON FOOD FESTIVAL MENU



Burger or bake? Creating illusion cakes is just one of the workshops anyone can take part in at this year's Bishop Auckland Food Festival.

PASTA MAKING, creating “illusion” cakes, and chopping vegetables like a pro are just some of the skills people can learn at this year’s Bishop Auckland Food Festival.

The hugely popular festival, run by Durham County Council, returns to the town on Saturday 22 and Sunday 23 April.

And hot on the heels of the latest celebrity chefs announcement, organisers have revealed details of a series of ticketed workshops aimed at children and adults.

The kids’ cookery workshops will be led by Twiddle Food owner, Viki Garbett, who grew up in Hungary and likes to add a Hungarian twist to her recipes.

Suitable for five to 12-year-olds, the 45-minute sessions will take place at Bishop Auckland Town Hall on both the Saturday and Sunday.

First up on each day is Hungarian chocolate biscuit roll making at 10.30am, followed by gnocchi making at 12 noon – gnocchi are little Italian potato dumplings – and colourful pasta making at 1.30pm.

Tickets are priced £4 per child and must be booked in advance from the Bishop Auckland Food Festival website at bishopaucklandfoodfestival.co.uk/kids-cookery-workshops-with-viki-from-twiddle-food/.

For those aged 16 plus there’s a trio of ‘have a go’ workshops run

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STUDENTS TEST SKILLS AT TICA

STUDENTS FROM Bishop Auckland College had an opportunity to test their practical skills while gaining an insight into the thermal insulation sector during a visit to the Thermal Insulation Contractors Association (TICA) national training centre.

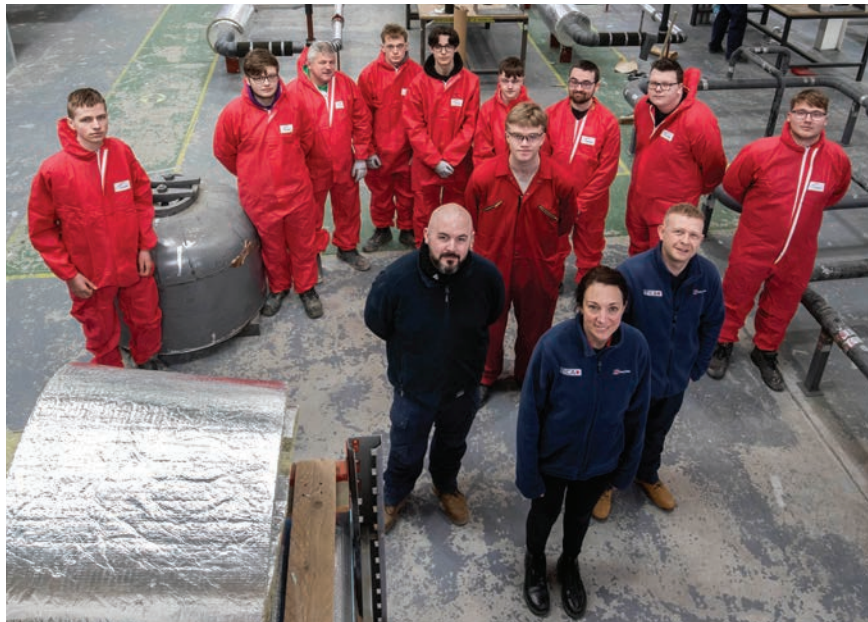
Twenty students toured the TICA facility in Darlington over two days as part of the Build UK Open Doors initiative, designed to highlight the wealth of career options within the construction industry.

During their visits, the students, who are taking courses in painting and decorating, construction skills and bricklaying, were briefed by TICA instructors and spoke with Level 3 apprentices attending the centre from across the UK.

They were also given an opportunity to cut and shape thermal insulation and fit it to the test rigs used by TICA apprentices as part of their training.

Helen Anderson, the trade association's head of learning, said: "Thermal insulation is not something that readily springs to mind when considering a career in construction."

"However, there is huge demand from employers for skilled apprentices being fuelled by a rise in construction projects and a shift towards

improving energy efficiency and reducing carbon emissions."

Michelle Andelin, head of school for construction at Bishop Auckland College, said: "Previously our students have visited construction sites as part of the Open Doors initiative, but this year we wanted to highlight different career pathways available within the sector."

"Our students listened to the experiences of former and current TICA apprentices, the opportunities available, as well as picking up a few practical skills."

Luke Picken, 17, from Bishop Auckland, who is

on a bricklaying course, added: "I enjoyed my visit to TICA. It was interesting because thermal insulation was something that was completely new to me and something that I had never considered."

TICA, which last year moved from an annual to quarterly intake for its Level 2 and Level 3 apprenticeships in thermal insulation, is currently training a record 130 apprentices, up from an average 60 to 80 a year.

It involves a mix of on the job training, supported

by block release workshop-based learning, allowing apprentices to gain the technical knowledge and practical experience to gain a nationally recognised qualification relevant to the thermal insulation industry.

In November TICA received an Ofsted 'good' rating in all five areas inspected: overall effectiveness, quality of education, behaviour and attitudes, personal development, leadership and management, and apprenticeships.

THE COUNTY COUNCIL OF DURHAM **BREWER STREET (REAR), BISHOP AUCLAND** **(TEMPORARY ROAD CLOSURE)** **ORDER 2023**

The Council proposes to make an Order under the Road Traffic Regulation Act, 1984 as amended, Section 14 (1) to prohibit all vehicular traffic from proceeding on a 13 metre length of Brewer Street (Rear), Bishop Auckland from the rear of no. 1 to 2 Brewer Street to enable new water connection works to be undertaken. The alternative route is from east side of closure north on Brewer Street to Cleveland Avenue then east on Cleveland Avenue to C130 Cockton Hill Road then south on Cockton Hill Road to Brewer Street to southern end of closure and vice versa. FUNDS OPEN CAREER DOORS FOR 16+

FUNDING IS now available to access a unique opportunity for residents in the Bishop Auckland & Shildon (BASH) Area.

Due to the success of previous projects, Bishop Auckland College has secured additional funding through BASH AAP to help residents, aged 16+, in the BASH area to progress, move closer to or move into employment, further training or volunteering.

There are three funds designated to supporting those in the age group:

- **Upskilling Fund.** Aimed at those in low paid jobs, to support them in acquiring new skills/qualifications, enabling them to move up the career ladder, change direction or gain additional work in a new sector. This opportunity is available where there is no mainstream funding available and where opportunities cannot be provided through employers' Continuous

Personal Development Fund (CPD).

- **Employability Skills Fund.** Aimed at responding to specific training needs, where there is no mainstream funding available.

- **Discretionary Fund.** Aimed at removing barriers, for example, travel, childcare, resources that prevent clients from accessing training and employment.

To date, the project has successfully supported in excess of 124 people into employment.

Andrew Walker, BASH, AAP Co-ordinator said: "I am delighted that the Bishop Auckland and Shildon AAP could once again provide funds for Bishop Auckland College to deliver the BASH Upskilling, Employability & Discretionary Projects.

"The grants support people directly to improve their employability prospects and will make a huge difference to people lives".

One beneficiary, Kieran Pickering, emailed Project Officer, Denise Hopps to say: "The funding towards this course has given me a huge advantage without which I would have been unable to complete, alongside the job opportunities that I would have gone without.

"I am very grateful for the opportunity to take this course and develop my skills further, which has widened my skill set and given me the opportunity to develop my career into something I have wanted to do.

"I would like to thank you and all the team for the opportunity, and funding. I have now gained employment and I'm ready to start my new role as an HGV driver!

PUPPIES SAVED BY POLICE

SIX COCKER Spaniel puppies who were just moments from death were rescued by officers at the weekend.

In the early hours of Saturday morning (March 18), PCs Liam Vernon and Luke Howie were travelling along the A689, leaving Bishop Auckland, when they spotted a vehicle parked up and the driver stood beside on the grass verge.

As they spun around to check everything was in order, they noticed the driver swinging a sealed carrier bag on the edge of the bank.

They put their blues on and parked up behind the vehicle. They then saw the man fling the carrier bag onto the front seat before starting to 'inspect' his tyre as the pair got out of the police car.

As the officers approached the vehicle, they could hear squealing coming from the passenger's side and, as they got closer, they realised it was the same bag the man had been swinging just moments before.

The officers untied the bag which was sealed tight and found the five-day-old Cocker Spaniel puppies inside. They were so young their eyes hadn't opened yet.

The driver was questioned at the roadside whilst officers monitored the puppies and arranged for the litter to be transported to a local vet for treatment.

The man, in his 50s, was arrested on suspicion of animal cruelty, money laundering and trafficking in a controlled drug and taken into custody. He has since been released on bail whilst enquiries continue.

All six puppies are now making a full recovery at a local vets and will soon be fostered.

As part of the investigation, search officers carried out a section 18 warrant of the man's address and rescued the puppies' mother and father too.

They have since been reunited with the litter and are also receiving treatment.

PC Liam Vernon said: "The puppies were riddled with fleas and if we'd have passed just seconds before, we would have been none the wiser.

"Both myself and Luke are huge dog lovers, so it has been one of those jobs which has really stuck with us, we've hardly stopped thinking about it but are just glad to have saved them – it really was right place, right time."

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Chopping vegetables like a pro is another of the skills people can learn at this year's Food Festival.

A grim, old timey, maritime delight.

Do you enjoy logic puzzles? Have you ever solved the clues, filled in the grid then sat back and smiled as satisfaction washed over you? If so, then Return of the Obra Dinn could be the game for you.

Not for the faint of heart, Return of the Obra Dinn is a sprawling interactive logic puzzle, set on the ill-fated ship - the Obra Dinn - in the early 1800's.

In this game you play as an insurance inspector, tasked with deducing what exactly happened on what is now a ghost ship that has recently drifted back to Falmouth.

As you explore the grisly scenes that took place onboard and the tragedy unfolds before you, it is up to you to piece together who is who and what fate befell each of them.

Armed with a crew roster, portrait, and a mystical stop watch, you will enter scenes of time past. Using your observational skills and wit, you will gather the clues available to identify all 60 souls.

This game is a triumph of not only detective work, but atmosphere. The old timey maritime aesthetic is complimented by nostalgic graphics - a subtly fantastic design choice simultaneously shielding players from the finer details of brutal scenes while also allowing the player to fill in the gaps of the horrors they are witnessing.

The phenomenal sound design paired with the fitting sound track will haunt you in the best possible way, bringing the still scenes that you are inspecting to life.

Every scene is filled to the brim with detail, things you may not notice at first but can lead to eureka moments down the line.

Finally, the non-linear nature of the game structure allows for fantastic storytelling, remaining full of surprises all of the way through.

If this has piqued your interest then I recommend that you don't read any more about this game and instead jump straight in, knowing that you have a harrowing yet fascinating journey ahead.

Also, when you bear in mind that this game was developed by the genius mind that is solo developer Lucas Pope, you may feel as much disbelief as I did that such a feat can be achieved by one individual.

Ghostface is back... People live and people die, and you'd better start running!

Scream VI has already set a franchise record with a fantastic opening weekend at the box office and rave reviews.

With any whodunit, especially a *Scream* movie, my biggest worry is giving my honest, open opinion on it without spoiling it for anyone. Also, I don't really want Ghostface to come after me, as he has promised to do to anyone who spoils the ending. Gulp!

The film has moved from its original setting of Woodsboro to the bright lights of New York City which gives it a grittier, fresher edge.

The "Core Four" of Sam, Tara, Chad and Mindy all return, alongside Gale Weathers. We also see the return of *Ghostface IV* survivor Kirby Reed, who now works for the FBI and has to work alongside Detective Bailey on the case.

The opening has a breathtaking and brutal twist and ends with Ghostface landing with one of his best lines from the whole franchise. As the body count mounts up, so does the list of suspects.

The team discover a shrine to Ghostface in a museum in an abandoned movie theatre. Every killer's mask and their costume are there. It's eerie, but for a huge *Scream* fan, also pretty cool.

As we head towards the big reveal, the pace picks up and I have to say, I loved the scene on the subway: it is Halloween and multiple New Yorkers are dressed as Ghostface...

The ending is as brutal as the rest of the film, with the team having to work together to not only try to survive, but unmask the killer or killers?

Before I give my closing comments, I want to give a few shout outs. Huge credit must go to the *Scream VI* PR and Marketing team for absolutely smashing the campaign on social media and hats off to Roger L. Jackson for once again scaring us silly with that distinctive voice of Ghostface.

Nothing will ever beat the original film in the franchise, but *Scream VI* gives it a good try. I mean really good.

BISHOPS WIN ON THE ROAD BUT FALTER AT HOME

BISHOP AUCKLAND FC continued their winning form after a crucial 3-0 home win against Whitely Bay at the end of February, winning twice on the road before coming unstuck at home against Whickham in midweek.

A trip to Newcastle to play Benfield on Tuesday 14 March ended in victory after Matthew Weirs netted the game's only goal in the 70th minute.

Chasing down a back pass, Weirs reached the ball ahead of the out rushing keeper and slotted it under him for the winner.

Then it was off to Teesdale Park to take on Thornaby on a wet and soggy Saturday for what proved a six-goal thriller with Bishops having to come from behind after initially taking a 0-1 lead into the break.

Midway through the

first half, a nice move from Bishops released Danni Lay to slot home from 10 yards.

In the second half, the heavens and defences opened, as water and goals rained down.

Thornaby levelled in the 56th and took the lead in the 61st minutes.

But the Two Blues were not done and in the 79th minute, a good cross from Marcus Giles found Lay who headed home from six yards.

Two minutes later, Bishops regained the lead when a cross from left was converted by James Fairley.

Bishops sealed their third consecutive win when Giles rounded the last defender and slotted home the fourth with the final kick of the game.

However, Bishops failed to grasp an opportunity to move up the table

when two late Scott Robson goals gave Whickham all three points in midweek.

Bishops remain in third place in the league with all to play for in the final five matches of the season.

This weekend they entertain Sunderland RCA at Heritage Park before a long trip to face Carlisle City on April 1st.

Indeed, Bishops' final two away matches of the season are across the Pennines, with a visit to Penrith being their penultimate game.

If Bishops can maintain a winning run between now and the season's conclusion, it could set up a tumultuous, winner takes all, final day encounter with Ashington who are currently a point ahead of the Two Blues, albeit with a couple of games in hand.
